Biographical Sketch

Dr. Kidane is a thoracic and foregut surgeon with a special interest in minimally invasive and endoscopic approaches to benign and malignant thoracic/foregut disease. He was recruited to Manitoba to establish an advanced diagnostic and therapeutic endoscopy program for thoracic and foregut diseases. He completed his MD at the University of Toronto and his General Surgery Residency at Western University. He then completed thoracic surgery residency at the University of Toronto, with additional third space and foregut training in McGill. His clinical program development focuses on strategies to incorporate MIS/Endoscopic techniques, multimodal therapies & logistics to improve patient & system outcomes. He has a research interest in health services and outcomes research as it relates to esophageal and lung cancer. Esophageal cancer is a devastating illness with historically poor survival; furthermore, the treatment of esophageal cancer can be difficult and cause significant reductions in the quality of life. Dr. Kidane's program of research in esophageal cancer brings together elements of surgical quality, patient quality of life, oncologic outcomes and health resource utilization with the ultimate goal of identifying the right treatment for the right patient at the right time.

He is the medical lead for CancerCare Manitoba's initiative focused on older adults with cancer, the incoming Secretary/Treasurer of the Canadian Association of Medical Oncologists, and Chair of the CCTG Small Cell Lung Cancer Working Group. He leads research focused on investigating biomarkers, treatment patterns, and outcomes for patients with lung cancer and older patients with cancer to identify opportunities for system improvement.

Donna received her certification in Health Care Administration in 1998 at the University of Saskatchewan, Saskatoon, SK, and the First Nation Health Managers certification in 2019 offered by the First Nation Health Managers Association. She is the former Health Director at Berens River First Nation Health Centre and Pauingassi First Nation Health Centre. In the past, Donna has been actively involved and participated on several committees. To name a few, she co-chaired the Southern Fly in First Nation Communities Partnership Collaboration committee and the Manitoba First Nation HIV/AIDS/STBBIs working group. In her spare time, she likes to walk/jog, try new baking recipes and spend quality time with family, including her puppy, Fido. Donna strives for greater opportunities regarding growth and development in health services and programs. She embraces the opportunity to engage and to ensure the First Nation clients achieve their full health potential, and by doing so, it is rewarding to witness positive changes, which will lead to mino-piimatisiwin (good health) of individuals, families, and communities.

Chantal Wahteeshkin (she/her) is Anishinaabe from Namaygoosisagagun First Nation in the Robinson-Superior treaty territory in what is currently known as Northwestern Ontario and Red River Métis from St. Laurent, Manitoba. Her nursing experience includes palliative care, labour and delivery, and dialysis before landing at Cancer Care Manitoba as the Indigenous Nurse Navigator in March 2024. Her role as the Indigenous Nurse Navigator ensures culturally safe and trauma-informed support for First Nations, Métis, Inuit, and Urban Indigenous Peoples, guiding them from the initial clinical suspicion of cancer through the entire cancer continuum, including survivorship or end-of-life care. Based out of Winnipeg, her role supports individuals and their loved ones across the province of Manitoba, as well as the Kiavlliq region of Nunavut, by providing access to advocacy, in-person support during appointments, information about the cancer journey and connection to cultural and/or spiritual supports and resources to name a few.

Dr. Tunji Fatoye is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Family Medicine at the Max Rady College of Medicine, Rady Faculty of Health Sciences, and a Family Physician in Oncology at CancerCare Manitoba.

Dr. Kidane's program of research in esophageal cancer brings together elements of surgical quality, patient quality of life, oncologic outcomes and health resource utilization with the ultimate goal of identifying the right treatment for the right patient at the right time.

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
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

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
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
